

## Grow Native Plants from Seed

Any time between November and the end of January, fill a pot that has holes on the bottom with moist potting soil.




2 Sprinkle seeds on top of the soil, press them down gently, and then sprinkle a little soil on top of



3 Label your pot with the name of your seed species.



Cover your pot with leaves and chicken wire to protect the seeds from birds and squirrels.



All winter long, keep the container outside in a place where it will receive snow and rain.




When the temperature rises in spring, place your pot in a partially sunny location, remove the leaves, and wait for the seeds to sprout. Keep the soil moist.

7 If the seedlings become too crowded as they grow, carefully separate their roots, and place some plants in additional pots.



Seedlings can be planted in the garden in summer or fall. Keep them well watered for their first year.



Most plants will come back stronger and larger in year two and will persist for many years.
